# **INVESTING IN THE HEART AND SOUL OF OUR COMMUNITIES**

Community centres are an important part of our youth. I have fond memories of playing baseball and hockey with the River Heights Cardinals, Tuxedo Lightning and the SJF Explorers. It is important for an MP to understand the needs of the grassroots of their riding. That is why in early September I met with the

Presidents of our community centres to talk about the challenges and opportunities they face, and how the federal government can support them. Generations of residents have benefited from the programming these centres offer with the support of the federal government. They are an integral part of our

neighbourhoods and I am committed to supporting them. If you've driven past the Crescentwood location of the Corydon Community Centre, you've noticed the new accessible spray pad and playground. \$811,000 of this project's budget was funded through the federal Canada Community-Building Fund.

#### **HOUSING & AFFORDABILITY**

All across the country, housing is a top concern. To make housing affordable, we need to build more homes, and we need to do it much faster. When Parliament returned in September, new legislation was introduced to remove the GST on the construction of new rental apartment buildings. This, in addition to working with

municipalities to cut red tape and the introduction of the Tax Free Savings Account for first-time buyers, is a crucial step in the government's plan to increase the housing supply, lower costs, and help more Canadians find a safe and affordable home.

I recognize that it's a difficult time for people in our riding. Recently, we called the CEOs of the 5 major grocers to Ottawa to demand action on food prices. This, along with the government's investment in \$10 a day daycare is assisting Canadians and allowing more women to enter the workforce. We will continue to work to bring relief to Canadians.

## TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION

For too long, Canada failed Indigenous Peoples.
Whether through unfulfilled treaties, residential schools, or colonial laws, generations have suffered harm and trauma from our past actions.

There once was a residential school in the heart of our very own community. The

Assiniboia Residential School opened on Academy Road in September 1958. More than 750 students attended the school. It was the first residential high school in Canada.

On September 30th I attended a ceremony to recognize the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and the one year anniversary of the unveiling of the Assiniboia Residential School monument and gathering place.

We came together in the spirit of reconciliation to remember and learn as we honoured the truths and stories of survivors and their families.

### MENTAL HEALTH AND ADDICTIONS

I was honoured to participate in Recovery Day Winnipeg 2023. I am committed to supporting the needs around mental health and addictions services. This includes continuing to advocate for supervised, safe consumption sites and greater investments in wrap around services. We need to take ideology out of the

narrative around treatment and recovery.

On November 30, 2023, the 9-8-8 Suicide Crisis Helpline, a national suicide prevention and crisis number will be launched in Canada.

Recently, we announced an \$8 million fund to enhance equity, diversity and inclusion in the distress line

sector. As a former teacher and principal, I know first-hand the impacts that mental health and addiction can have on youth and their families. We need a coordinated and collaborative approach to solving these challenges, and I will use my voice in Ottawa to build bridges that help us get there.
